

The Northern York County Regional Police Department is asking for the public to help fight crime by taking part in the NYCRPD Video Registration Program. The video registration program allows residents and business owners to voluntarily register the fact they have installed video surveillance systems at their home or business.

Through the NYCRPD Video Registration Program, detectives and officers will now be able to quickly determine where those systems are located and contact the homeowner or business representative to ask them to review their video. If the owner finds something believed to be of value on their recording, they can contact NYCRPD to have the detective or officer to return to look at it.

Video registration is voluntary and there is no cost associated with registration. Participants in the program can retract their registration at any time. An individual's personal information will be kept confidential by NYCRPD, subject to disclosure per court order. People who register their cameras with the Police Department will only be contacted if there is a criminal incident in the vicinity of their surveillance system. If necessary, NYCRPD officers may request a copy of any video captured by a participant's camera. Registering a camera does not provide NYCRPD with direct access to view video captured on the system.

We Need You! Strinestown Community Fire Company is strictly a volunteer fire company. In a year, we average between 300 and 400 emergency calls. Strinestown Community Fire Company is the sole provider for Conewago Township. Every firefighter volunteers their time to help you in a time of crisis or in the time of need. There are two types of Members. An Operational Member is for someone who is 18 years or older that is interested in participating in fire/rescue calls. Experience is not necessary and free training is offered. A social member is for an adult that is not interested in responding to fire/ rescue calls.

Reminder! Make sure smoke detectors are working, are tested, and the batteries are changed every year. This is your first defense of being hurt or killed. Smoke detectors should be on every floor and outside every bedroom. Fire extinguishers should be placed in the kitchen, garage, and near the furnace. There are many different types of extinguishers. When purchasing an extinguisher make sure that it meets the most common fires found in a home.

New Engine! Around August 2022, the new 26-2 engine will be arriving. This engine will replace the current 26-2 engine which is a 1992 International and will be housed at the main station 26-1 located at 5690 Susquehanna Trail. This was only possible through grants, loans, and generous donations. We are excited to be able to better serve our wonderful community.

Northeastern Area EMS (NEAEMS) is an emergency medical service that provides emergency care to residents of Manchester Borough, Mount Wolf Borough, East Manchester Township, and parts of Conewago Township. These emergency medical calls are dispatched by the York County 911 center based off of established "box" assignments. Currently Conewago township has a total of 3 separate EMS organizations that provide primary emergency medical services to the township. In the event that one of these organizations are out on another emergency call, York County 911 will dispatch the next closest unit based off of the predetermined "box" assignment.

NEAEMS offers a membership program where for a small fee a family can become members of the ambulance, which means if they utilize the ambulance services, that whatever remaining portion of the bill is not covered by their insurance company, the patient will not have to pay for. This could be a large savings to anyone who uses an ambulance just one time.

NEAEMS has reciprocal membership agreements with Newberry Fire and EMS where NEAEMS and Newberry Fire and EMS honor each other's Ambulance membership. What this means to the Ambulance Membership Owner: In the event you own a Newberry Fire and EMS membership and NEAEMS is dispatched in a next due capacity to handle an emergency call, NEAEMS will honor Newberry Fire and EMS's membership.

Important Update Newberry EMS has discontinued service as of September 30th, 2021. Community Life Team medical transportation has taken over their area. Look for their annual membership drive in the near future. Any questions, call 717-848-4740 and of course in an emergency call 911.

Currently Dover EMS which serves part of Conewago Township in the area west of Jug Road and South of Canal Road does not participate in a reciprocal agreement with NEAEMS. What this means is that in order to be covered by both Dover EMS and NEAEMS it is in the best interest of those living in the western areas of Conewago Township to belong to both Dover EMS and NEAEMS. Conewago Township has a contract with the SPCA of York County to provide services to our residents.

Below is a list of provided services.

- Yearly and Lifetime Dog licensing, microchip and rabies vaccination clinics.
 - Animal Related Municipal Ordinance consultation.
- Full record keeping and documentation required by the Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Dog Law Enforcement.
- Low-cost spay/neuter assistance including programs for outdoor stray cat colonies and discounted spay/neuter for all pit bulls.
- Humane investigations, citations and prosecutions of animal cruelty and neglect.
- Veterinary care for sick and injured animals through SPCA Second Chance Program.
- Temporary foster and veterinary care for pets of domestic violence in conjunction with YWCA Hanover's Safe Home, YWCA York's Safe Home, the Red Cross, Bell, YMCA Men's Shelter and Life Path.
- Humane education programs for York County youth through elementary and secondary educational institutions.
 - Pet food for elderly residents living on a fixed income or for financially disadvantaged residents through SPCA Pet Food Pantry Program.

Animal Control

All calls regarding dog control must be made by calling **911**.

Wildlife and cat issues are not handled by the Township and will have to be contracted privately by the resident.

WHEN AND WHAT PERMITS ARE REQUIRED

From time to time residents ask when do I need a permit or when is a permit required. Many don't realize that there are various permits required for different projects.

BUILDING / UCC PERMITS

A building permit is required for all construction projects, residential, commercial, industrial and agricultural. The application should be submitted 30 days prior to actual construction. All construction projects must meet the 2009 International Residential Code for residential use and the 2009 International Building Code for commercial and industrial uses. To determine if your project is applicable call the township office .



POOL PERMITS

When swimming season is in, all residential in-ground and above-ground, pools capable of holding 24 inches or more of water requires a permit either temporary or permanent. All pools with sides less than 48 inches high require a fence of 48 inches high. All Spas/Hot tubs require permits.

ON-LOT SEWAGE PERMITS

Sewage Permits are required for all new and repairs to existing on-lot systems

DRIVEWAY PERMITS

Permits are necessary for all new driveways. The re-paving, repairing or improving of an established existing driveways require permits & Stormwater Management needs to be addressed.

AUTOMATIC ALARM PERMITS

Permits are required for automatic alarms that emit a sound or transmit a signal or message when activated.

This only lists a few of the more common permits that are required. Each property owner is responsible to obtain the necessary permits prior to the start of construction. Normal hours for permits are Monday– Thursday 7am-5pm. Call before you stop by for permits as the Building Permit Officer may be out on inspections or code enforcement issues.

Stormwater Applications/ Permits

All new impervious surfaces created must address stormwater i.e. sheds, garages, sidewalks, patios and pavilions.

Storm Water Management

What is polluting York County's waters?

There are two major types of pollution that York County's streams and creeks are being impacted by - and they might not be what you would expect.


Nutrients - Nutrients are found in lawn and farm fertilizers, animal waste, septic systems, and industrial sources. Two nutrients in particular - nitrogen and phosphorus - are found in high quantities in York's waters. These nutrients get picked up by stormwater and washed into the streams. Nutrients can be good, but too much can cause problems for aquatic life.

Sediment - Sediment is made up of small particles of dirt and other debris that gets washed into streams from fields, yards, and roads, and also from erosion of the banks of the streams themselves. Sediment turns water murky and blocks sunlight that plants and aquatic animals need to survive.

Where is the problem?

Impaired waters can be found in almost any part of York County.

The Susquehanna River's many tributaries all pick up pollution as they wind their way across fields and through towns. York County has several major creeks: the Codorus, Conewago, Kreutz, Muddy, and Yellow Breeches, but pollution can be found in any small stream or creek. There is no single source - or solution.



Storm Water Management

Background

In 2010, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) surveyed York County's water health. They discovered that, much like other parts of Pennsylvania, more than 50% of the County's streams are polluted. EPA put all of Pennsylvania on a "pollution diet" restricting the amount of pollutants that can be added to the State's waterways.

In the next three years, York County must reduce the amount of pollution entering its streams by the equivalent of more than 10,000 dump truck loads. To meet that goal, we must invest in green technology and prudent management - not just with expensive new municipal treatment plants.


What are the consequences of inaction?

- Higher water and sewer bills for costly upgrades to treatment plants.
- More regulations for individual homeowners, such as lawn fertilizer controls and further restrictions on building.
- Increased regulations for small farms, resulting in higher food costs.
- Loss of fish habitat and recreational opportunities.

York County Taking Action

We all have a role to play in healing York County's waters. Homeowners, renters, farmers, and elected officials - everyone who works, plays, or lives in York County can help.

Cities, townships, and boroughs have a responsibility to plan stormwater control projects. These projects help reduce pollution in our local streams and creeks, and can help reduce local flooding, which causes damage and creates road hazards.



Storm Water Management

Here's What You Can Do

Research ways to reduce stormwater runoff from your property.

Projects like rain barrels and rain gardens are just some examples of ways you can help reduce the amount of stormwater runoff from roofs and driveways. For more ideas, visit www.watershedsyork.org.

Check your local Stormwater Management Ordinance when making changes to your property.

Every municipality in York County has rules for dealing with stormwater. Your municipality can help you understand the requirements. You can also use the York County Integrated Water Resources Plan Flowchart Tool, at www.PAIWRP.com.

Report illicit discharges.


If you see water or another substance being discharged from a pipe or opening, and suspect it is illegal, contact your local municipality or the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection.

If you have a septic system - maintain it properly.

Malfunctioning septic systems are a major source of nutrients being improperly released to local streams. Even if you can't see a problem, a poorly maintained or neglected septic system can be contributing to pollution in nearby streams. Contact your local municipality for guidance.

Report flooding problems to your local municipality.

Flooding from excessive stormwater is a sign that a stormwater system may not be functioning properly. In addition, surging water picks up sediment and nutrients and quickly sweeps it into nearby streams and creeks.



Stormwater Management Ordinance #344

Effective November 6th 2013

Storm Water Management Requirements

Any building permit application that proposed any new impervious area must first satisfy the requirements of the Stormwater Management Ordinance #344.

All new impervious surfaces created must file a Storm Water Management application. It is the property owners' responsibility to control runoff from their property. If the property owner builds or replaces on their lot something that covers the ground so that rainwater cannot penetrate or the paving of a driveway, something must be done to allow the runoff to soak into the ground under a normal rain condition.

An approved storm water management plan is required with new construction that involves over 1200 square feet of area. New homes, additions, accessory structures, pole buildings, or garages, and changes to driveways or landscape that will impact stormwater runoff on your property, then you are required to comply with Conewago Township's Stormwater Management Ordinance #344. Stormwater applications can be found on the township's web site.

Stormwater is rainwater and melted snow that runs off streets, lawns and other sites. When stormwater is absorbed into the ground, it is filtered and ultimately replenishes aquifers or flows into streams and rivers. In developed areas, however, impervious surfaces such as pavement and roofs prevent precipitation from naturally soaking into the ground. Instead, the water runs rapidly into storm drains, sewer systems, and drainage ditches....

This requirement is a mandate from the United States Environment Protection Agency EPA, Pennsylvania Department of Environment Protection DEP and the County of York. Failure to comply with the mandates, Conewago Township as a whole would be subject to penalties from DEP and or EPA or both.

Yard Waste is...

material such as tree trimmings, shrubbery and other organic landscape vegetation not listed below.



How to Prepare Yard Waste

1. Place yard waste in biodegradable brown paper bags or bundle it with biodegradable twine in easy-to-handle bundles.
 - Bundles may be no longer than 4 feet in length.
 - Bundles may not weigh more than 30 pounds each.
 - Branches may not exceed 6 inches in diameter.
2. Once prepared, yard waste must be placed at the curb on scheduled pick up day before 6:00 am.
3. An unlimited number of bags or bundles may be placed at the curb.

DO NOT place these items out for yard waste collection:

Grass Clippings



Fruits & Vegetables



Tree Stumps



Dirt & Stones



Please prepare your yard waste properly.
Yard Waste in plastic bags **WILL NOT** be collected!

Observed holidays are noted in **RED**. Collection days that fall on or after the holiday will be delayed one day. **EXCEPTION:** If holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, there is no change in service prior to or after the holiday.

BASIC RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES



- Trash, Recycling, and one bulk item must be curb side by 6:00 AM on your scheduled collection day.
- No more than three (3) trash bags or containers will be collected each week.
- Bags or containers must not exceed 33 gallons or 50 pounds.
- Yard Waste will be collected on the first Saturday five (5) times per year. (See calendar above)
- Yard Waste must not exceed 5 feet in length and must be bundled.
- Call Penn Waste to schedule collection of appliances containing freon (air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, etc.)
- No construction debris will be collected curb side.

Burning of recyclable material

is prohibited as addressed in The Conewago Township Burn Ordinance #354 under **SECTION 4. Burning Regulations** J. Pursuant to Act 101 of 1988, known as the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act, 53P.S. ss4000.101 et seq., and Township Ordinance No. 342, no recyclable items shall be burned, including but not limited to, newspaper and inserts, magazines and catalogs, junk mail and envelopes, office paper, corrugated cardboard boxes cereal, soda, tissue boxes and other paperboard packaging, paper towel and toilet paper cores, paper bags and phone books and leaf waste. Burn permits and previously issued Burn Permits are no longer valid. Wood items can be ground up into mulch. Spring Valley Mulch on Mill Creek Rd. is a certified recycling facility for tree trimmings.

Getting Ready For Winter

It will soon be that time of year to get out the snow shovel and deicer and get ready for whatever Winter may bring. Here are a few tips to help you cope with and expedite the snow removal from your street. We ask that you PLEASE remove your vehicle from the street during a storm. This will enable the Public Works Dept. to clear the street and get you on your way in a reasonable amount of time. Plow operators are urged to take precautions to avoid hitting mailbox posts. During a storm visibility is reduced and makes it difficult for drivers to see a post in time striking it or pushing it over with plowed snow. Any installation within the right-of-way, including a mailbox is placed there at the owner's risk.

This illustration gives a tip on clearing an area to allow plowed snow to unload before driveway. It is illegal to deposit snow onto Township or State roads to clear a driveway or a mailbox. Clear a 36 inch path around fire hydrants to allow for access for emergency equipment. We will do our best to clear your street, so please be patient and remember we have probably worked many hours before you have to start shoveling.
